tinue our essential push toward ending homelessness through establishing a respite from the streets and the woods in the form of The People's House shelter and day center, and through our efforts on getting people into permanent housing through the stellar work of the SideWalk center. As we work on these things together, because we come together from diverse traditions to work on these things, we cannot help but promote interfaith understanding and cooperation while doing it.

I believe that the spirit that has enabled those efforts can and should be put to work on something else: It is the paralysis of our major social institutions through the break down of civil discourse in society.

And when we live that faith, we cannot abuse the other, because we recognize that there is no other, there is only us.

The fact is, that the public forum, wherever and however we now define it, often becomes a shouting match where the participants tend to demonize rather than debate, and seek conquest rather than understanding, or compromise and resolution.

To achieve this we don't need to agree on theology. We don't need to agree on economics or politics. It is enough to agree -- as Torah, Qu'ran, Gospels, the writings of the Bah 'u'llah, the Upanishads and the classic Buddhist sutras all agree -- on the essential unity of the human spirit, because that belief, that faith, leads us inevitably

to the place of compassion for our sisters and brothers in the human family. And when we live that faith, we cannot abuse the other, because we recognize that there is no other, there is only us.

We have started discussions on this, and are fur-

thering the effort with Cornerstone Conversations on such issues as intercultural relations, justice,

hunger and homelessness. I am not suggesting that the basic



techniques of civil discourse be added to these topics, (although we might think about it for the next round), but to suggest that we will make headway in those areas and the larger social justice portion of our vision and purpose when we as a society begin to relearn those basic techniques. And this organization is uniquely poised for the reasons stated, to be a force for reestablishing that basic building block for establishing social justice the ability to reasonably

discuss how to achieve it.

There is not a great mystery on many of these techniques. Our friends at the Dispute

Resolution Center model them daily and teach them to others. We

can consciously teach them and model them in our

forums, our testimony, our interactions as an organization and in the forums we initiate. We can cajole others into using them. And if we do this and do it well that may do more to fulfill our mission and
